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**N**ovember has been a very interesting month in the bitcoin space. With the start of November heralding the collapse of FTX the various scam coins started a prolonged nose dive into what we will state is the beginning of the end for the crypto-crime space.

When CZ of Binance decided to share his holds of the FTX tokens (FTT) it devalued FTX (the world's 2<sup>nd</sup> largest crypto-exchange, based in the US) and Alameda (its sister business) to the point where Sam Bankman-Fried (SBF) decided to pretend they were hacked and do a runner with their remaining customer funds, allegedly around \$600 million.

It seems that all of FTX customer funds were being used by the FTX core team to gamble on various crypto-scambling coins. Though in large parts it appears that the FTX core team was simply stealing customers funds and washing it through barely known crypto-coins and then "disappearing" the monies somewhere.

It seems that there was also some tie-in with the US democrat political party and Ukraine; more is yet to be revealed.



And the ongoing collapse of the house of cards is still a story that is unfolding as the FTX card that got pulled out continues to take other legit and not-so-legit businesses down with it.

Publishing encrypted data on blockchain, does it make it insecure? GDPR prohibits it, is this based on truth of the matter or based on lack of trust, understanding in encryption technologies. Are their security concerns are justified. Most countries apart from EU don't have same regulation as gdpr as well.

Btw, there is a way to publish only second tx which guarantees integrity of the former, where you can have even unencrypted edi.

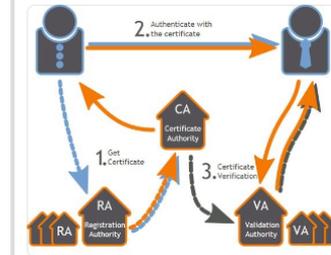

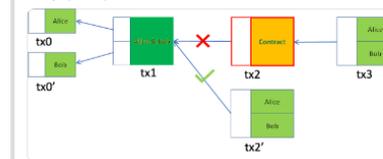
